NRRA Cooperative Recycling Programs

Single Stream

Single Stream Recycling allows recyclers to put all paper products, glass jars and bottles, aluminum and steel cans and plastic containers in one collection container. The materials are then separated and processed at a MRF (Material Recovery Facility) and sold to end-markets. To find out if Single Stream Recycling works for your community, call NRRA at (603) 736-4401 and talk to Member Services.

Acceptable Materials:

Paper: newspaper, magazines, office paper, phone books, folders, brown bags, cardboard/boxes, paperboard, shoe boxes, catalogs, books, beverage cartons, egg cartons, junk mail (window envelopes accepted) etc.

Plastics, metals and glass: #1 - #7 plastics, foil, glass jars and bottles, aluminum and steel cans, including empty aerosol cans.

Unacceptable Materials:

No garbage, window glass, food, diapers, toys, potato chip bags, vinyl siding, styrofoam of any type, bubble wrap, hypodermic needles, packing peanuts, light bulbs, any sharp objects or containers that previously contained hazardous liquids, such as pesticides, etc, or small propane tanks, etc.

What happens to the Single Stream Recycling materials recycled through NRRA?

This mixed material is taken to a MRF (Materials Recovery Facility) and separated into its various components – aluminum cans, cardboard, mixed paper, newspaper, plastics, steel cans and glass jars & bottles. Once separated, these materials are transported to various markets domestically and internationally.

Dual Stream

NRRA's Dual Stream Program allows you to collect and/or accept recyclables in two streams: fibers (mixed paper, newspaper & cardboard) and containers (aluminum & steel cans, glass jars and bottles and plastics).

Acceptable Materials are typically stored and transported in 30 yard open-top, roll-off containers.

1st Category:

Paper: newspaper, magazines, office paper, phone books, folders, brown bags, cardboard/boxes, paperboard, shoe boxes, catalogs, books, beverage cartons, egg cartons, junk mail (window envelopes accepted) etc.

2nd Category:

Plastics, metals and glass: #1 - #7 plastics, foil, glass jars and bottles, aluminum and steel cans, including empty aerosol cans.

Unacceptable Materials:

No garbage, window glass, food, diapers, toys, potato chip bags, vinyl siding, styrofoam of any type, bubble wrap, hypodermic needles, packing peanuts, light bulbs, any sharp objects or containers that previously contained hazardous liquids, such as pesticides, etc, or small propane tanks, etc.

What happens to the Dual Stream Recycling materials recycled through NRRA?

This mixed material is taken to a MRF (Materials Recovery Facility) and separated into its various components – aluminum cans, cardboard, mixed paper, newspaper, plastics, steel cans and glass jars & bottles. Once separated, these materials are transported to various markets domestically and internationally.

Consolidation

This program picks up processed commodities at your facility, regardless of quantity and consolidate them at a central location. This would be done on a preset “regular schedule” or on an “on call” basis.

Program Objectives:

- * To consolidate materials from multiple facilities at one central location;
- * To substantially reduce storage requirements at your facility by picking up materials on a regular basis;
- * To create additional processing space to allow for incoming material;
- * To increase your revenue by shipping maximum (full) loads of consolidated materials;
- * To increase handling and processing efficiency; reduce transportation costs.
