## Executive Director’s Report

Through the commitment of many Co-op members, it has been another great year. Membership is on the increase with a year end total of 357! A special welcome to Salisbury, our first Connecticut Co-op municipal member. Members sent over 57,000 tons of 15 different recyclables to market – a new Co-op record! And member’s technical assistance requests for minor issues, such as how to produce heavier bales as well as more in depth issues such as complete recycling facility design, keep our member services representatives always busy.

The School Recycling CLUB, a fun and innovative way to encourage kids to be active recyclers, boosts a membership of 86,880 children from 182 schools. A U.S. Environmental Protection Agency grant helped fund the CLUB’s development of a student recycler peer matching program. The CLUB also received support from Public Service of New Hampshire (PSNH) by being selected a Manchester Monarchs PSNH Power Play participant, receiving a donation each time the Monarchs enter or score on a Power Play.

The processed glass aggregate program (PGA), a partnership between the Co-op and NH the Beautiful, continues to be an important Co-op program. Currently there are three Co-op PGA host sites – Keene, New London and Goffstown and 25 feeder members and, to better serve Co-op members, we look forward to adding new host sites in the coming year. The Co-op is once again seen as a national leader; the PGA program was featured on the front cover of the June 2004 national magazine *Resource Recycling*.

US Department of Agriculture, Rural Development Solid Waste Management Program has once again chosen the Co-op for grant funding. This has allowed the Co-op the needed funds for expanding programs, for example the new, very popular equipment maintenance program of which many Co-op members have already taken advantage.

Unfortunately, Todd Ellis, a long time, well respected New Hampshire recycling professional moved out of state this past year. He has been much missed by both Co-op staff and members. However, the addition of two great new staff members – Kristie Owens and Alex Colflesh – has helped keep operations moving forward.

In closing, and as always, an enthusiastic thank you to all of those active Co-op supporters. It is a pleasure to be the Executive Director of this organization, one which allows me to work with incredibly dedicated staff and wonderfully committed members. I look forward to another exciting year full of accomplishments, keeping recycling a cost efficient and effective means of waste management for our members.


### Plastics Recycling Improvement Project

## NRRA Subsidiary: New Frontier Industries, Inc.(NFI)

October marks the first anniversary of equipment installation in the Milton plant. The past twelve months have been challenging. The first four months were spent learning how to operate the equipment to produce a marketable sound barrier board. February and March saw testing of the new boards and final refinement of the sound barrier die. April was the beginning of marketing on the sound wall. May saw the delivery of the decking die and the summer was spent developing the decking board and selling sound wall.



works very well with sound reduction up to 10 db in our tests. It can be installed as high as 30 feet. We have made a variety of colors and finishes to match your shifts with no snags.

As well, the real challenge now is to sell sound board. The first order was to NH DOT on the I-93 widening project. With that order, sales have been very slow. To date, we have manufactured and sold about \$80,000 a month in sales to break even. We are working to build sales. First, we are working with DOT's in New Hampshire to place orders this year. So far we are likely to get about \$100,000 in the spring with additional work to come next summer and fall. We have two companies to submit proposals to Mass Highway on the I-93 project next year. If we are successful on at least some of these

efforts, NFI will be successful. Our second strategy has been to work on commercial sales. As of the first of October, we have a full-time marketing director who is building a system of manufacturer's representatives. He is also selling wall directly to fence companies along the eastern seaboard. Initial interest indicates monthly sales of about \$30,000. Finally, we are negotiating with another manufacturer with a proven sales system to market our wall board under their brand name.

**EverGreen Deck.** Our second product should be available commercially this fall. We are fine tuning the production runs during the next six weeks.

We have collected 500 tons of plastic during the past year and sold more than 60 tons of products. Our staff is still very limited but we anticipate growing this month. We have concluded a contract with Hewlett Packard to take their scrap plastic and they will be paying us about \$2,000 a month to hire additional help to process the plastic. We have also sub-licensed the technology to TECHROW, a company in Massachusetts. TECHROW is providing us with marketing resources and will initially manufacture their products in our plant. Eventually they will move manufacturing to their own plant with non-compete limitations and with a percentage of their gross going to NFI. Thank you for your support and patience as we grow.
