## Town of Lee (NH) Recognized for Utilizing Most NRRA Programs in 2015

EPSOM, NH (June 1, 2016) The Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRA) honored the town of Lee, NH with the “Most Programs through NRRA - 2015” Award on Monday, May 16 2016 at NRRA’s Annual Conference and Expo held at The Radisson Hotel in Nashua, NH.

The town of Lee, New Hampshire utilized 20 different programs through NRRA including construction and demolition debris, electronics, fibers, plastics, propane tanks and refrigerant recycling among many other materials.

In addition, Lee, NH utilized NRRA cooperative purchasing programs in buying a storage container and purchasing baling wire. Separation of non-ferrous items such as copper, brass, wire, etc. took over 11,000 lbs. of precious metals out of the scrap metal bin and yielded over \$5,000 in revenues for the Town of Lee.

In all, Lee, NH was able to sell 1,017,899 pounds of recyclable materials through NRRA in 2015.

“This award highlights the town or organization that is making the most of the NRRA programs,” said Michael Durfor, Executive Director, NRRA. “We hope that this award inspires other towns and organizations to find new revenue opportunities for recyclable materials that may currently be going into a landfill.”

NRRA is a non-profit organization that provides member towns, organizations and individuals with cooperative purchasing programs, educational and networking opportunities, technical assistance, and cooperative marketing programs. NRRA currently offers members 35 cooperative marketing and purchasing programs.

NRRA’s grassroots beginnings were based on the premise of “cooperative marketing” with communities working together to create increased tonnage of materials to gain market leverage and better pricing for their high quality recyclables.

Roger Rice, Lee NH’s Transfer Station Manager, accepted the award on behalf of the town.
