Brian Bartram (Salisbury, CT) Receives Special Recognition Award for Recycling Efforts

EPSOM, NH The Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRRA) honored Brian Bartram with a Special Recognition Award on Monday, May 16th 2016 at NRRRA's Annual Conference and Expo, held at The Radisson Hotel in Nashua, NH. The Special Recognition Award recognizes those individuals who have gone above and beyond to improve recycling.

For the past nine years, Brian Bartram has been the Transfer Station manager for the Salisbury-Sharon, Connecticut transfer station. During this time, he has helped improve trash disposal and increase recycling locally, statewide in Connecticut, in New England states and nationally.

Bartram is an active member of the Northeast Resource Recovery Association, Connecticut Solid Waste Advisory Council, Connecticut Product Stewardship Council and Salisbury-Sharon Transfer Station Recycling Advisory Committee. In addition, he fostered a student-driven recycling program at Salisbury Central School and was selected to serve on Connecticut Governor Daniel Malloy's Connecticut Modernization Recycling Advisory Council in 2012.

Charlie Kelley of Salisbury, CT, who is on the NRRRA Board of Trustees and serves as Secretary on the Board, nominated Brian Bartram.

"Brian encouraged me to be on the NRRRA Board of Trustees," said Kelley. "I could not fulfill my duties as an NRRRA trustee, nor my committee work for Salisbury-Sharon, without his partnership."

The Towns of Salisbury-Sharon are annually listed being among the highest recycling percentages in the State of Connecticut.
